Notes: Conisborough from the Anglo-Saxon *Cynigesburgh* (the defended burgh of the King). Held by King Harold I and appropriated by William de Warrene, son in law to William I after Harold's

death at Hastings. The present castle was probably founded on an existing Anglo-Saxon site.

The first Motte and Bailey stronghold was replaced by this unusual round keep between 1163 –

1202. By around the 16th Century it had fallen into decay and consequently was spared further destruction during the English Civil War. It inspired Sir Walter Scott for his historical romance
